I admit there's a bit of a "which came first" dilemma here (the foreign military/colonial interventions or the fundamentalist/traditionalist backlash), but still I have to wonder how effective a recruiting tool our continued presence and resulting civilian casualties (however unintentional) are for underemployed, impressionable, impulsive and impatient young men. Ask yourself: how would the young American men that you know react to the mistaken killing of their parents by a foreign soldier in their own home?

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
