### MEETING OF THE ADVISORY COUNCIL May 20, 1937

Present: Boyer, Bovard, Burrell, Gilbert, Hollis, Leighton, Smith

The meeting was called by President Boyer to meet with Dean Lawrence for consideration of matters concerning his budget for the School of Art and Architecture.

Dean Lawrence presented a digest of developments in terms of enrollment and the effects of budget cuts over a period of years upon the quality and effectiveness of the School in performing its functions. His digest indicates that when various recommended standards for art and architecture schools are used as criteria, the effects of the budget cuts and the shortage of teaching staff show that the School is now in critical and immediate need of more adequate support, increase in library and teaching materials, and increased staff.

Dean Lawrence presented his budget in detail which is not reproduced here. According to his report his supplementary budget calls for \$3340.00 to be provided out of supplementary funds allotted to the University. Dean Lawrence's budget was unanimously approved.

The Council voted to have the following recommendation transmitted to the President and the Chanceller:

The Council recommends that the School of Art and Architecture shall be permitted to add a professional fee to the regular University costs to a student majoring in the Art School, and further that this School be permitted to add in the same manner a smaller fee for service work for non-majors taking professional work. This recommendation is strengly urged because it seems apparent to the Council that the School of Art and Architecture will be forced to choose among the following alternatives if it is to continue in operation:

- I. Reduce standards by resorting to heavy teaching loads, inadequate library materials, and other undesirable devices.
- II. Reduce the number of offerings by elimination of departments, such as interior decoration, painting, and others.
- III. Rigidly limit enrollment in the School.
- IV. Charge a compensating fee to offset the higher costs of instruction in the Art School as compared to costs in other divisions or schools.

The fourth alternative is, in the belief of the Council, the only logical alternative to choose since it is of utmost importance to the University's ability to serve its functions that standards of instruction and offerings of the Art and Architecture School be maintained at the present level and higher, if possible.

It was moved and passed to place the question of space allotment on the agenda for the next meeting.

# MEETING OF THE ADVISORY COUNCIL June 1, 1937

Present: Boyer, Smith, Gilbert, Boyard, Burrell, Hollis Absent: Leighton. Smith acted as secretary in Leighton's absence.

Professor Norris and Mr. Lindstrom appeared before the Council to present the case for the supplementary budget requests for the Physical Plant.

. Boy najdiry roi meason will bi Are the election for the consideration Mr. Lindstrom opened the arguments in regard to the need for two new men on the administrative side at \$2400 each. He pointed out that the bufden of detail was so great that the superintendent of grounds and buildings could not handle both the office detail and the actual work of physical supervision in the various departments of work. Mr. Lindstrom stated that there has been a great deal of delay on repair jobs and that the superintendent also lacked time to check and to see that these repair jobs are properly done. Mr. Norris added that the janitors are not at present properly supervised nor is their work well-organized. Mr. Norris then presented an organizational set-up for the department of Physical Plant, copies of his diagram being appended. He pointed out the need for a building and maintenance supervisor to check up on repair and on defects of the physical plant. He said that repair needs should be foreseen and the upkeep needs anticipated. Norris explained in detail the organizational plan which he and Lindstrom proposed. He backed up his arguaments by references to his highly detailed report of an inspection of all buildings, using the Commerce Building as a particular instance. "The new buildings", he said, "have much more complex and elaborate mechanical equipment --- air-conditioning apparatus, unit heating, etc. There are at present no mechanics in the University employ thoroughly qualified to handle this new equipment. The University plant budget, Norris added, "is much below that of the College, the College having in fact 50% more money allocated to the plant. This disparity is all the more striking in view of the fact that E.D.R. (square feet of radiation)

at the two institutions is very nearly equal, the exact figures showing the E.D.R. for the College 164,000 and for the University 153,000. Mr. Lindstrom next mentioned the need for replacement of the panel truck for mail delivery, and following this, Item #4 under the plant budget proposals was presented, chiefly by Norris. His argument for the new irrigation water lines may be summarized as follows: roughly, 3,000,000 square feetof campus space need to be irrigated. Mr. Norris' tables showed the following figures in regard to existing and projected irrigation systems for the campus:

The \$4500 requested would be spent chiefly for pipe and for electrical equipment. Trunk line pipes would be laid through the tunnels.

Item #5, dealing with the completion of the Skelton survey, was next presented. Norris considered this the most important item in all the supplementary budget proposals for the Plant, i.e., from the engineering point of view.

The next items, #6, in regard to the sewer investigation, he thought might properly be charged to the Oregon State System of Higher Education as a part of the Chancellor's special repair budget, because of its close connection with the safety factor for the roof of McArthur Court; at present drainage facilities are not adequate to carry off the load of water from the roof in the case of heavy rains. Generally, the 8" sewer pipes are inadequate to carry both sewage and rain water, and generally during the winter rains water rises 10 feet in the manholes near the power plant.

Item #7, dealing with engineering office expense, was next discussed. Norris backed up his case by referring to his survey of the campus buildings. He pointed out that of 63 classrooms, only one meets the requirements which illumination engineers think essential, namely a 15 -candle minimum. The average for these 63 classrooms is a 6-candle illumination, a wretched condition of affairs. Mr. Norris' survey of acoustics in the classrooms shows that acoustics are if anything worse off than the illumination factor. In the new physical education building, however, the acoustics are fair. Even here, however, they had to skimp, using accustical wall proofing with a coefficient of absorption of only .3, whereas .6 would have been ideal; but this latter material would of course have been too costly. Mr. Lindstrom next presented the case for Item #8, automobile servicing, which was discussed at some length. Mr. Norris followed with the case for an additional steam line along 13th Avenue to serve as a connecting link balancing the steam pressure in the two main service lines.

And finally, Item #11, polishing machine for the new Library floors, was discussed. The members of the Council then asked Mr. Lindstrom for data in regard to the proportion of the total budget expended for the Physical Plant and he gave the following figures:

Overhead has been cut 50% as compared with 1930. Janitorial costs in 1930 were roughly \$30,000 and in 1935-36 came to about \$19,000. Expressed in cost per square foot, these figures show a reduction of 5.8¢ per square foot to 3.4¢. This reduction is partly due to change in wage rates, but partly due to better organization of the work. Mr. Lindstrom pointed out that the portion of the budget allocated for instruction is relatively much higher in the University than in the state system as a whole. The figures are as follows:

It was moved by Smith and seconded by Boward that a 50% book fee per term be added for all courses in which the student used the library, the resultant funds to be pooled and put into the University library budget, ear-marked for books, periodicals, etc. After some discussion, mostly adverse, it was moved by Dean Gilbert and voted by the Council that this motion be referred to the library committee for study.

The question was again raised of an increase in the salary of the Head of the University News Bureau, Mr. Godfrey. Mr. Godfrey is at present devoting 1/6 of his time to the work of the State Planning Board as publicity director for them, so he is at present receiving 5/6 of his salary on the reduced rate from a \$3,000 base. The request that his salary base should be raised to \$3600 in order that he might receive an actual \$3,000 cash for 5/6 time was denied. All five members of the Council present voted in the negative.

Burrell moved that the funds necessary for the salary proposals for associate and full professors (proposals which the Council had previously strongly recommended) should take precedence of all items recommended in the supplementary budget, except such requests for increase in requisition and budgets and materials as were absolutely indispensable to departmental operation. The motion was deconded by Gilbert and all five members of the Council voted affirmatively.

Meeting adjourned.
